DIGITAL DIALOGUE Guidelines

Our purpose is to understand how other people react to our images, to learn what other people are doing, to share our methods, to learn how to improve our methods, to learn new methods, and to interact with other photographers.

These groups are for learning. This is not a contest, but rather a sharing of images, techniques, and personal reactions. The intent of our groups is to show the work that we would sincerely like to have an opinion on, such as what looks good and what we could do to improve it.

Submit images that look good to you to find out what other people could suggest to make it better! If the image has won a medal or an HM, or even just accepted in an exhibition, it should not be presented for comment since we already know it has merit.

You will learn how other people see and interpret your images. You will get differences of opinion. People have different tastes and skill levels. You will learn new techniques and share yours. Your photographic horizons will be broadened by the interpretation and input of others!

2 Easy Steps for Learning and Sharing with your fellow PSA members

1. Before the 10th of the month, you e-mail one image (or a before and after image) to your group's administrator, with your "how I did it" description.
2. Within 10 days of the images being uploaded, you review and comment upon the other images by typing into the comment box located on each member page. You must be logged into your group before being able to make comments.

IMAGE SIZE

- Current recommended size for your images is 1024 pixels wide by 768 pixels tall and 72 dpi, but not to exceed 1Mb in size.
- Use sharpening after you have reized your original image but before saving for the web.
- File size should be in KB not MB. Using Save for Web at maximum or highest will give you an acceptable file size.

IMAGE DESCRIPTION "HOW I DID IT"

- Give it a title as you want it to appear on the website and also add the month it is going to be posted
- Suggested items to include (when they matter) are the camera and lens, polarizer or other filter on the lens, automatic or manual settings, scanner if you used a slide or negative, photo editing software name, f/stop and shutter speed, tripod or not
- Description of the subject matter
- The effect you're trying to achieve or why you took the picture (what point were you trying to make) – so the other participants can give their opinion on your goal.
- What steps did you take in Photoshop or your chosen editing software or app?
- Along with your finished image, you can submit an additional image to show a "before" (original) or "during" image. This image is often smaller in size.

ABOUT COMMENTS

- Don't get upset - not everyone sees their own crooked horizons!
- No scoring, no numbers, no stars, just "studying" and describing our opinions in words
- Try to give a reason for your opinions. Try to say something more than "I like it" or "It is nice."
- Making negative comments is easy, so be sure to include positives as well.
- Remember these are opinions and preferences and interpretations, not right or wrong matters. There isn't always a right or wrong, often merely preferences.
- We don't know what the other person knows, so let us take any constructive criticisms in a positive manner.



DIGITAL DIALOGUE Guidelines (continued)

- The group is supposed to be a fun sharing of ideas and an enlightening sharing of our reactions. The more creative the suggestions, the better!

WHAT TO SAY IN COMMENTS

- Impact when first seen
- Did the maker employ any special techniques that enhance or detract from the image?
- Might you have done anything differently?
- How might you achieve the same effect using another technique?
- What do you like and why?
- Be diplomatic with criticisms.
- We all know that there is often more than one way to perform a digital technique, so let us be generous in sharing other methods.
- You can suggest software, app, camera body, lens, or other equipment that might make a difference.
- Evaluate the image using your own knowledge of composition, lighting, subject choice, cropping, filter, border, camera technique, software technique, etc.

IMPORTANT EXTRA TIPS

You can download the image, work on it yourself, and upload your rendition at the same time that you post your comment, in order to show what you would do to improve it or to show another version.

1. Prepare your "revised" image before you post your Comment.
2. To download the original image, right click on top of it and choose Save Picture As or whatever words will do the same thing on your computer.
3. Make your revisions and save as a jpg or Save for Web as a jpg with a maximum size of 1Mb.
4. Go to post your Comments and use the Browse button under the Comments to get your "revised" image. Then submit both Comments and revised image simultaneously. Don't e-mail the image.

Problems with meeting deadlines

- Please notify your administrator in advance as a courtesy when you know you cannot meet a deadline or will not be able to participate that month.
- If you are going to be away near the deadline but have time to create your image, it is all right to e-mail the image ahead of time, even a month or two ahead.
- When you know you cannot do BOTH the image or the Comments due to your schedule or accessibility to the Internet, it is okay to do just one, but please notify your administrator.
- Administrators – please do not make it known in advance when a member is away on vacation. It is not wise to publicize such info on the Internet or in an e-mail. Members will realize what is happening when there is no participation.
- About once a year, any member or group can take a "vacation" and have no images for a month. Please notify your administrator if you decide to take a month off.
